## Arab Spring: Social Constructivism as a New Method of Regime Change

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Mostly, Social Constructivism is used as a concept in the Social Sciences to address social movement and to understand rational human behaviour. Concurrent to this, there had been many dialogues on social constructivism related with the realist approach. Recently social constructivism became more relevant to analyze social trends and uprisings.

Continually dictatorships in the Middle East region created political problems as well as social problems among Muslim and Non-Muslim communities.
